

# Asylum statistics for the North East- as at December 2005



This publication includes data for the 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter (Q4) of 2005, relating to October to December 2005.

It includes the most recently available information from regional, national and some European statistics on the number of asylum seekers and their circumstances. Please note that not all the information relates to the same period largely due to the different publication dates of the source material.

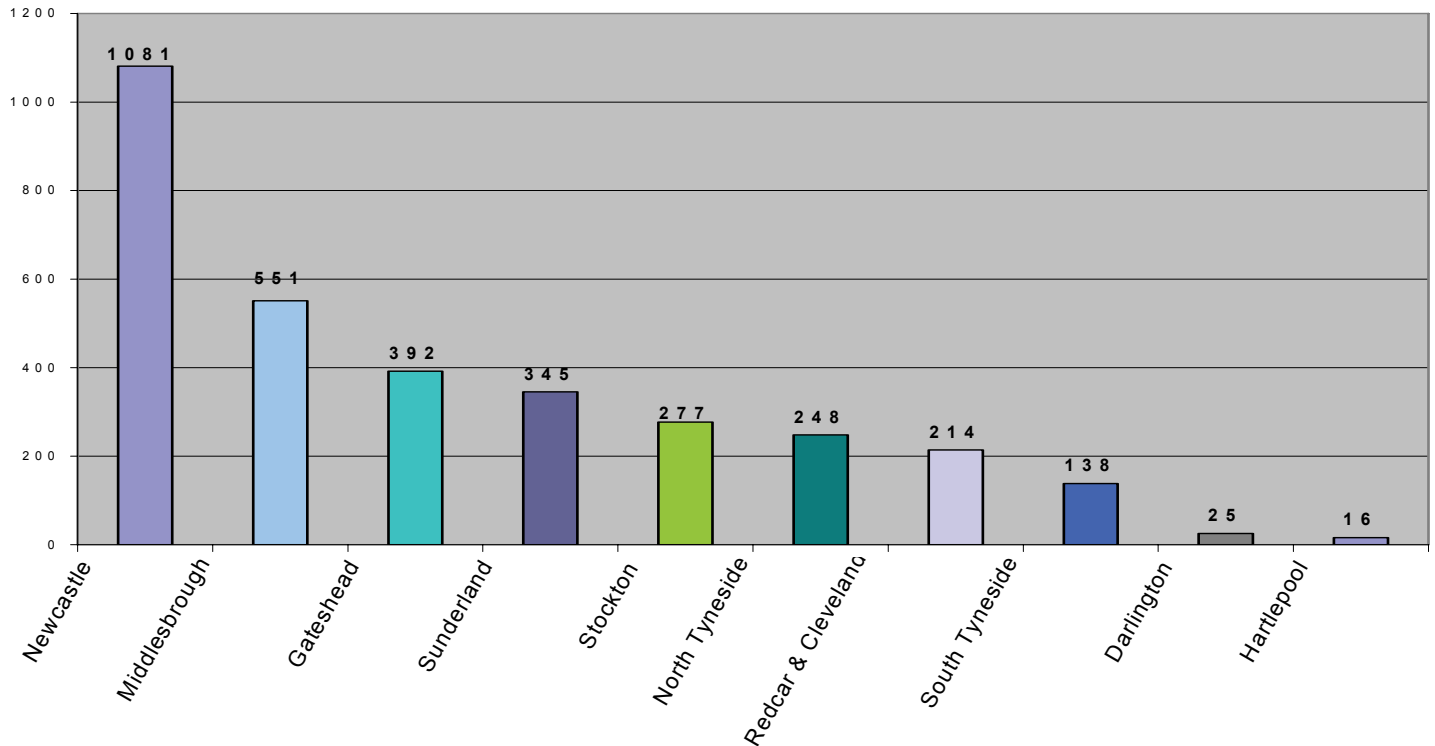
## Summary

1. As at December 2005 there were 3287 asylum seekers in the North East in NASS accommodation, a decrease of (4.58%) from September 2005. The majority, 1,081 (32.9%), are living in Newcastle [Page 4 and 5]
2. The main nationalities of asylum seekers in the North East are Iranian (12.2%), Turkish (7.3%) and Angolan (7.2%). [Page 6]
3. The total number of asylum seekers in the UK who are supported by NASS (The National Asylum Support Service) is 49,430, a decrease of 4% from the previous quarter. Greater London has the largest number with 11,300 followed by Yorkshire and Humberside 8,020. [Page 7]
4. 6,165 Asylum applications in the quarter nationally 2% lower than previous quarter, (6,315). The main countries of origin were Iran (13.3%), Eritrea (9.6%) and Afghanistan (8.27%). [Page 8]
5. The number applying for NASS support nationally was 6,030 a decrease of 12% from the previous quarter. The main nationalities applying for NASS support were Iran (15.9%), Eritrea (9.2%) and Somalia (7.29%). [Page 9]
6. A total of 5645 asylum applications received initial decisions, 13% lower than the previous quarter. The number awaiting a decision was 6,400. 10% of initial decisions were granted asylum in Q4. [Page 10]
7. Successful applications for Section 4 ('Hard Case') in Q4: 960, 36% lower than previous quarter – mostly from Iraqis. [Page 11]
8. 5,060 appeals were received, 7% lower than previous quarter and 5,540 were determined, and were 52% lower than in Q4 2004. [Page 12].
9. 214,500 applications received in countries in the EU15, 239,800 received in EU25 countries, Total for Europe was 255,300, the grand total of Applications was 326,900 (Jan-Dec 2005) [Page 13]
10. 235,300 asylum requests submitted in the 36 Industrialised Countries in the first nine months, 181,000 new applications submitted in Europe in the first nine months. Number of new asylum requests in the United Kingdom fell 24% during January – September compared with same period 2004.

## Supported Asylum Seekers in the Region – including dependants

### Asylum seekers supported by the local authorities

- In the North East there are 10 different Local Authorities where the majority of asylum seekers are accommodated. The Chart below shows individual asylum seekers supported in NASS accommodation.



### Subsistence Only (SO) supported Asylum seekers

There are **75** asylum seekers in the **North East** who are not in NASS accommodation and receive only subsistence (cash) support from NASS. In total there are **14,050** clients getting only subsistence support throughout the country. The North East had **0.53%** of this number. **10,000 (71%)** of all asylum seekers in receipt of subsistence only support was located in London.

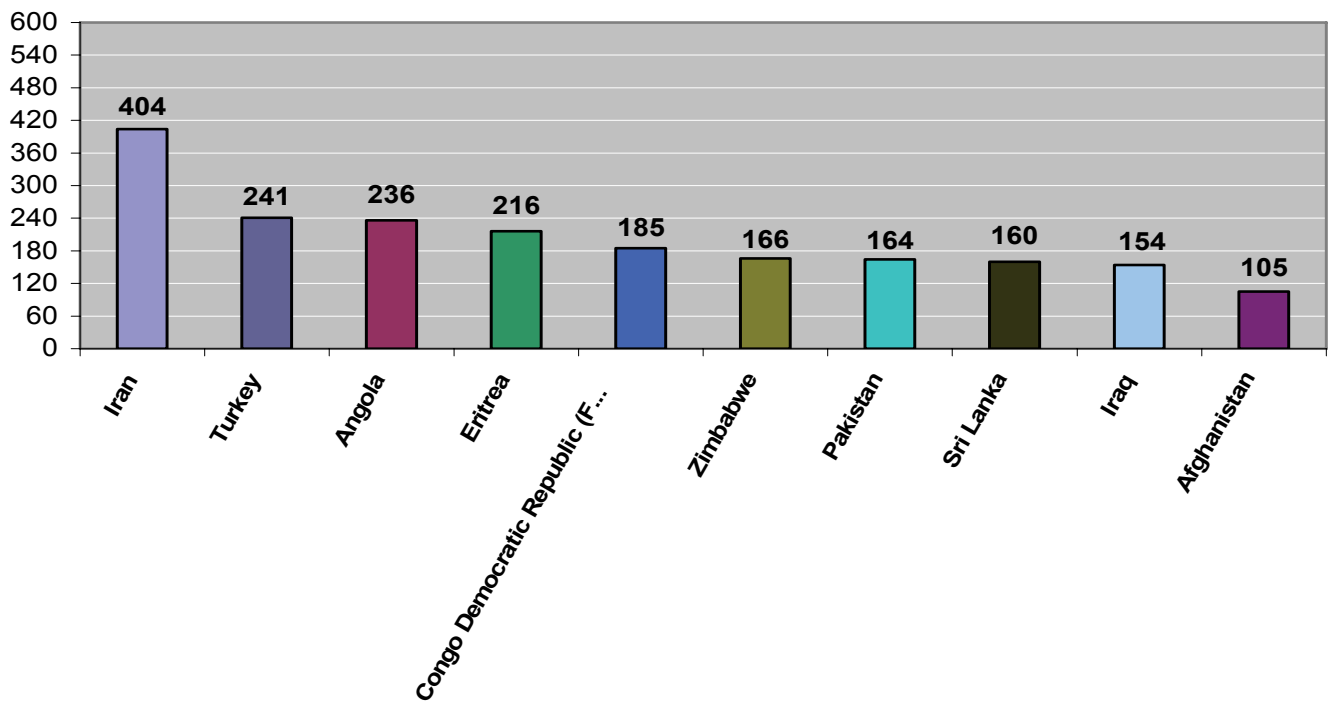
## Nationality of Supported Asylum Seekers in Region – including dependants

## Supported Asylum Seekers by Region – including dependants

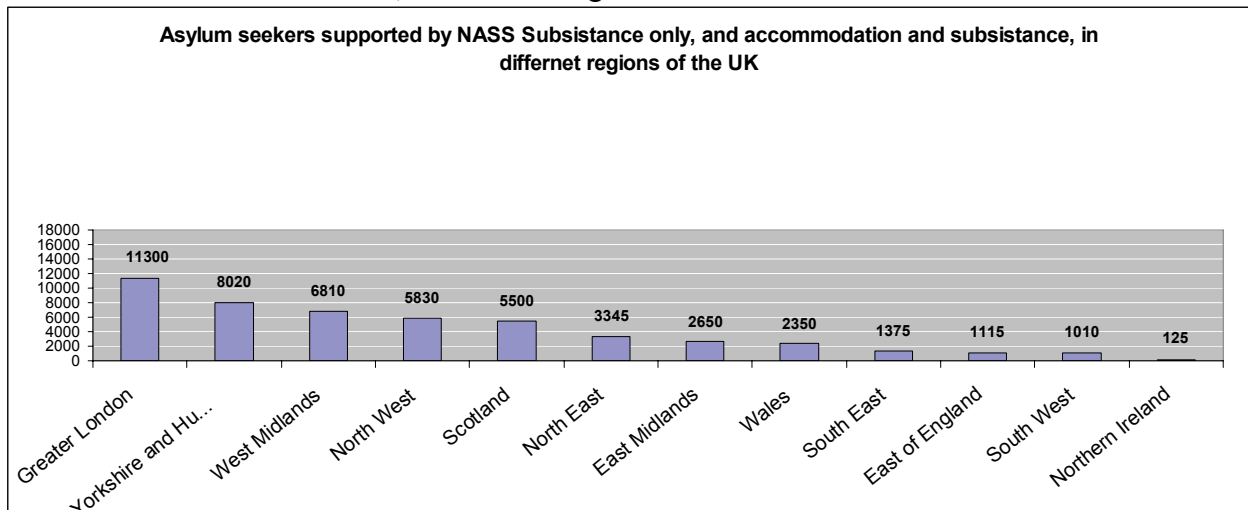
### Asylum seekers in different regions of the UK

The totals below represent the numbers of asylum seekers who are currently in NASS accommodation or are in receipt of subsistence (cash) only support. They reflect the numbers of new applicants granted support and exclude applications for those for whom support has ceased. These figures do not include asylum seekers who are not supported by NASS.

#### As at the end of December 2005:

- **14,290** asylum seekers were receiving subsistence only support
- **35,140** asylum seekers were supported in NASS accommodation
- Thus a total **49,430** asylum seekers were in receipt of NASS support as at the end of Q4 of 2005 which is **4%** lower than the previous quarter (Sept-05 = **51,495**)

The chart below shows the number of asylum seekers supported by NASS Subsistence only, and by accommodation and subsistence, in different regions of the UK as at the end of December 2005.



- ♦ The regions with the highest populations of asylum seekers supported by NASS in order of numbers were: Greater London (22.9%), Yorkshire and Humberside (16.2%), North West (13.8%), West Midlands (11.8%), Scotland (11.1%), the **North East** is in sixth place with **6.8%** of all the asylum seekers supported by NASS in the UK.

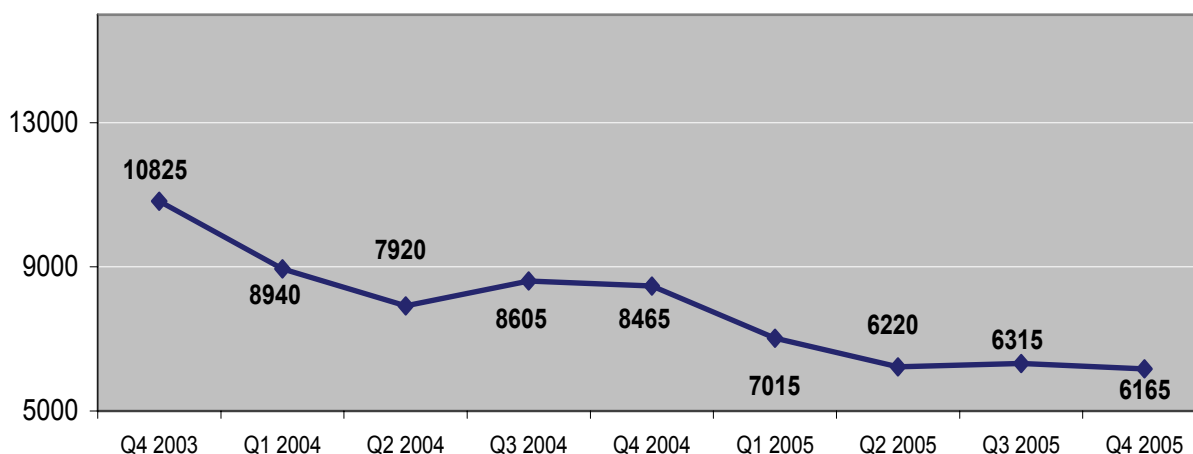
## Asylum applications – National

### Number of applications for the past 9 quarters

- Applications: 6,165 2% lower than previous quarter

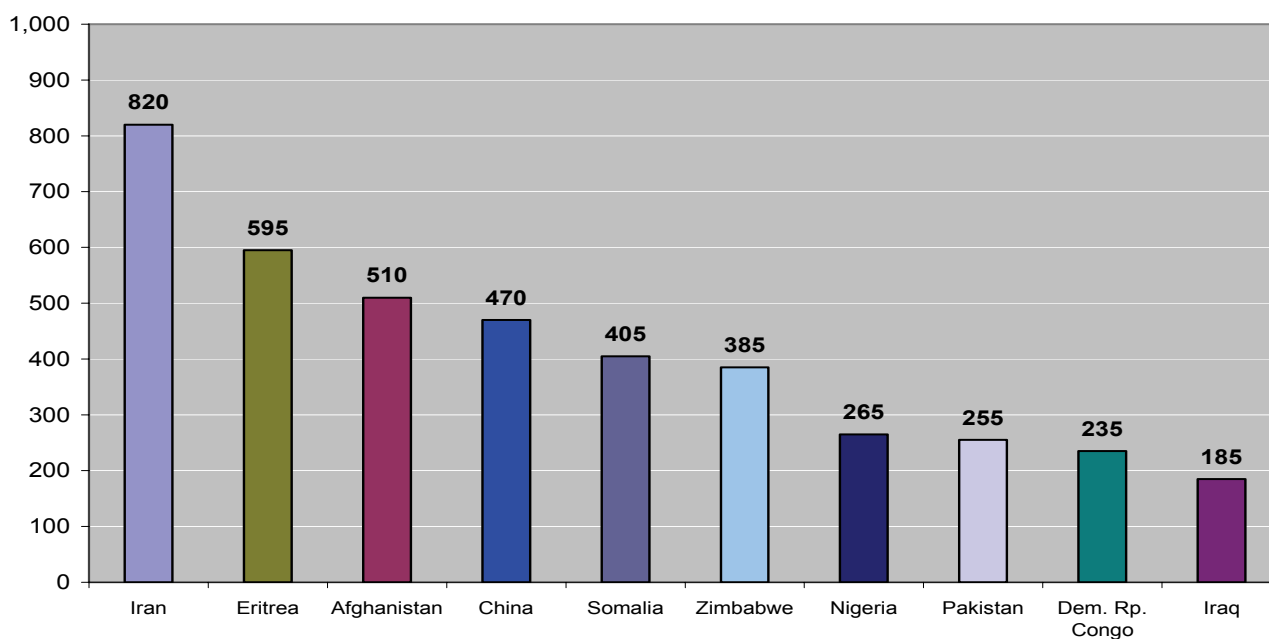
Applications for asylum (excluding dependants) in the UK decreased by 2% in Q4 to 6,165, from Q3 (6,315) and was 27% less than Q4 2004.

### The top ten nationalities applying for asylum in Q4 of 2005

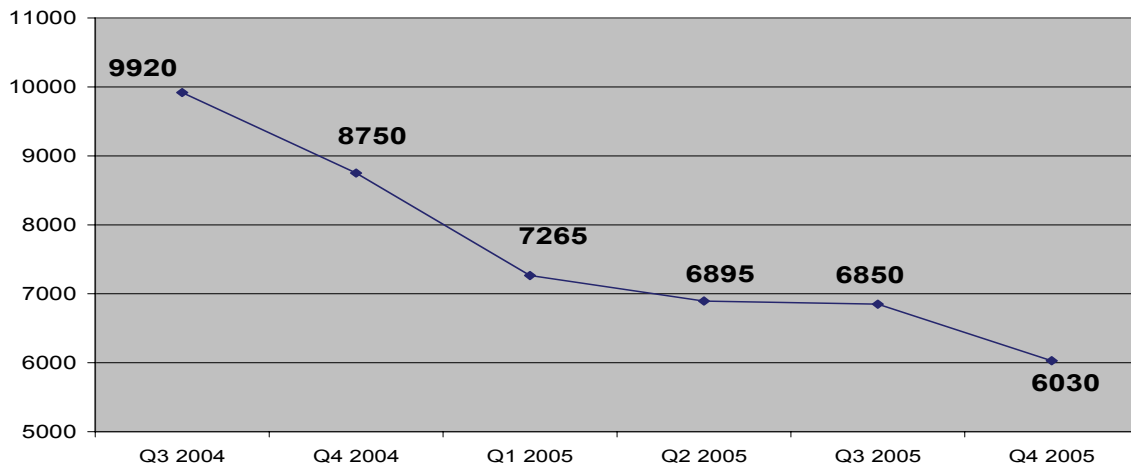
## NASS applications - National

### Number of NASS applications made in the past 6 quarters

- **Total applications: 6,030 which was 12% lower than previous quarter**

The number of applications for NASS support in Q4 was 6,030 12% lower than Q3 (6,850) and 30% lower than Q4 2004 (8,645).

In Q4, 4,830 (80%) applications were from single adults and 1,200 (20%) were from family groups.



- **Support type:**

- In Q4, **4,115 (68%)** applications were for accommodation and subsistence support and **1,515 (25%)** of applications were for subsistence only support.
- The remaining 7% of applications were classified as invalid or unknown.

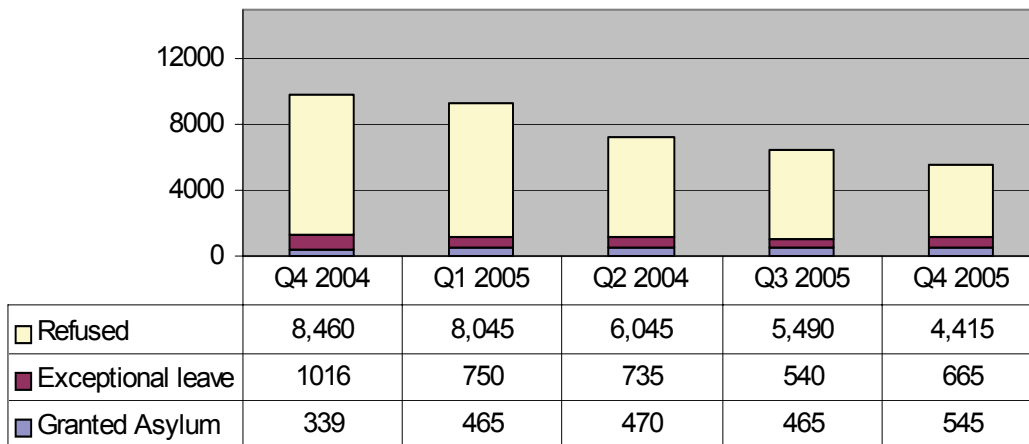
## Asylum application initial decisions – National

### Number of decisions made for the past 5 quarters

#### • Initial Decisions in Q4: 5,645, 13% lower than previous quarter

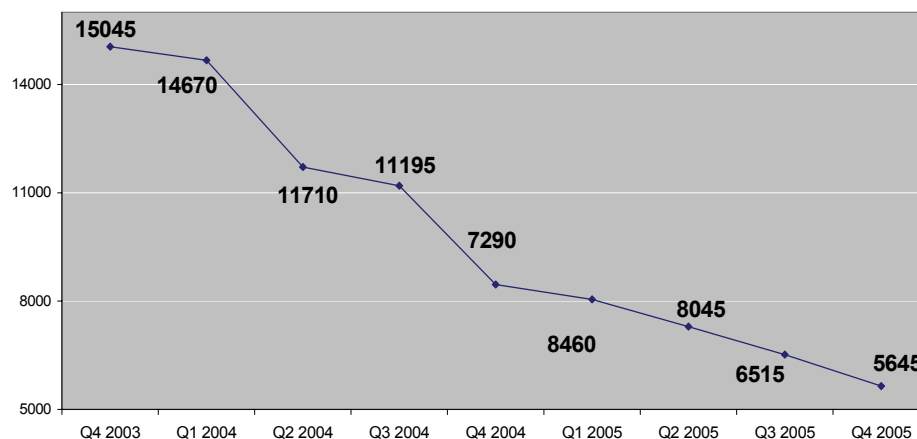
- 5,645 initial decisions were made in Q4, 13% lower than in Q3 (6,515) and lower than the level of applications.
- The number of cases awaiting an initial decision was 6,400 at the end of December 2005 (9,700 at the end of December 2004). Of this total, 4,300 cases were work in progress, i.e. the application had been outstanding for 6 months or less.
- 10% of initial decisions in Q4 granted asylum, more than Q3 (7%). 12% of initial decisions granted humanitarian protection or discretionary leave, more than Q3 (9%). 78% of initial decisions in Q4 were refusals, lower than Q3 (84%).

### Timeliness of Initial Decisions

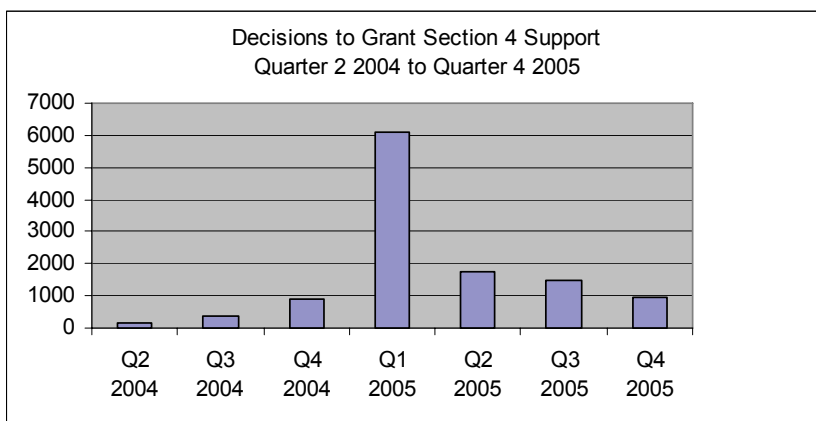
- 77% of applications received in Q3 (July to September) 2005 had initial decisions reached and served within two months, the same level as Q2.

*Support under section 4 ('Hard Case') of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 is provided in the form of accommodation and food, and other basic essential items. Individuals are generally eligible for section 4 support if their asylum application has been finally determined as refused, but they are destitute and there are reasons that temporarily prevent them from leaving the United Kingdom. These reasons are:*

- unable to leave UK by reason of a physical impediment to travel or some medical reason; or
- unable to leave UK because there is no current viable route of return to the country of origin; or
- taking reasonable steps to leave the UK or place themselves in a position in which they can leave the UK; or
- permission has been obtained to proceed with a judicial review against a decision relating to the person's asylum claim; or
- the provision of support is otherwise necessary to avoid a breach of the person's human rights.

- The number of successful applications for section 4 support in Q4 2005 was (960) 36% lower than in Q3 2005 (1,510).

- Decisions to grant Section 4 to Iraqi nationals fell by 71% in Q4 to 235, compared to 800 in Q3 of 2005.



- As at the end of Q4 (December) 5,145, excluding dependants, were in receipt of section 4 support, 33% lower than at the end of Q3 (September) (7,630). The fall is due to improving country conditions in Iraq.

## Asylum appeals - National

On 4 April 2005, the commencement of section 26 of *The Asylum and Immigration (Treatment of Claimants, etc.) Act 2004* introduced the appeals system under the *Asylum and Immigration Tribunal (AIT)*. All outstanding work from the *Immigration Appellate Authority* has been transferred to an equivalent appeal stage within the AIT, in line with transitional provisions. Data on determinations refer to cases dealt with by *Immigration Judges*. All appeals figures are provisional and subject to change.

### Appeals received

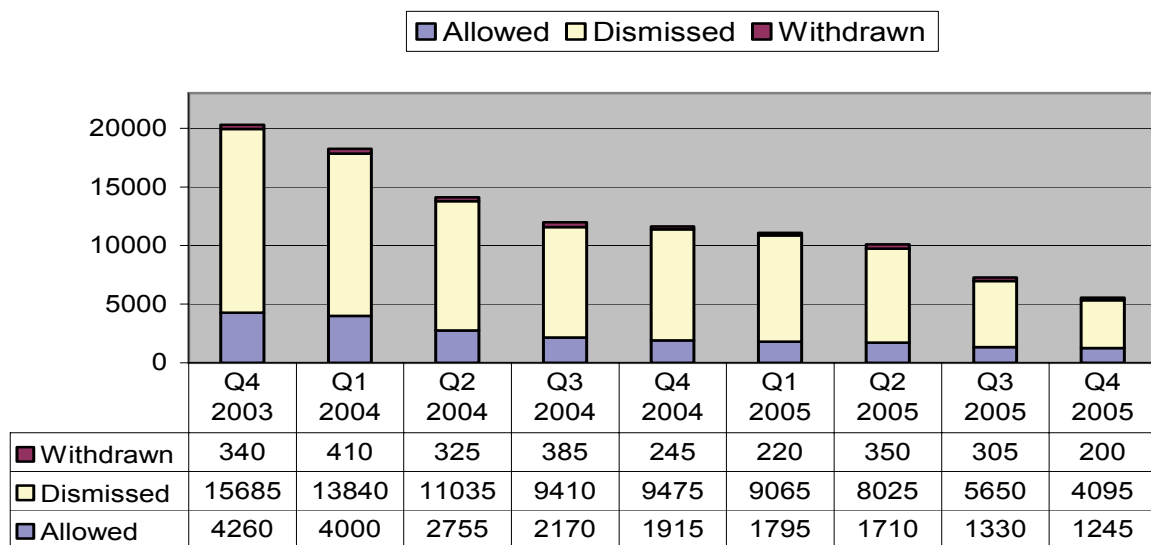
- Appeals received by AIT in Q4: 5,060 7% lower than previous quarter
- 5,060 appeals were received by the AIT in Q4, 7% lower than Q3 (5,455).

### Appeals determined

- Appeals determined fell in Q4 by 24% to 5,540 from 7,290 in Q3, and was 52% lower than in Q4 2004 (11,640).
- The proportion of appeals dismissed was 74% in Q4, whilst 22% of appeals allowed.
- The total asylum work in progress at the AIT at 31 December 2005 was 7,000.

### Timeliness of case processing, up to and including appeals at Immigration Appellate Authority and Immigration Appeal Tribunal

- 67% of applications received in 2004/05 had a final decision, up to and including appeals, within 6 months, compared with 63% for 2003/2004.

## Asylum seekers and refugees worldwide

### Asylum Levels in industrialized Countries, Q3 2005

This section is based on monthly asylum application data received from national asylum authorities in Europe, North America, Australia, New Zealand and Japan. Currently, 36 industrialized countries are providing monthly statistics to UNHCR. Italy is the only major industrialized country for which no monthly data are available.

235,300 asylum requests made during the first nine months of 2005.

- The number of asylum requests submitted in the **36 industrialized countries** has continued to drop although the end of Q3 saw an upturn in applications. During the first nine months of 2005, 235,300 asylum-seekers applied for asylum, 17% fewer than during the same period in 2004 (282,100) and 35% below the corresponding period in 2003 (364,400).
- In **Europe**, 181,000 new asylum applications were submitted during the first nine months of 2005, 18% fewer than during the corresponding period of 2004 (220,500) and 35% below the level of the first three quarters of 2003 (276,600). The 24 countries of the **European Union (EU)** registered a 16% fall in new asylum applications submitted during January - September 2005 as compared to the first nine months of 2004 and 32% fewer requests than during the January – September 2003. The largest fall in half-yearly asylum levels was reported by the 10 **new EU member countries**. During the first nine months of 2005, these countries received 18,600 new asylum requests, a 33% drop compared to January – September 2004.
- During the first nine months of 2005, **Europe** received 77% of all asylum applications submitted in the 36 industrialized countries, **North America** received 22% of the total inflow, while **Australia and New Zealand** accounted for the remaining one per cent of the asylum requests.
- The number of asylum requests increased during the most recent quarterly period. From July - September 2005, 78,800 asylum applications were submitted in the **36 industrialized countries**, 4% more than during the second quarter of the year (76,000). In **North America**, the increase in new asylum requests from Q2 to Q3 of 2005 amounted to 8%.

### Countries of asylum

- During the first nine months of 2005, **France**, received 38,700 asylum applications or 16% of the total number of asylum-seekers. The **United States** continued to be the second leading asylum-seeker receiving country, accounting for 37,500 asylum applications or 16% of all applications submitted. The total number of new applications submitted to the US Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and the Executive Office of Immigration Review (EOIR) during the first half of 2005 fell by 6% compared to the same period of 2004.
- In the **United Kingdom**, the number of new asylum requests lodged during January – September 2005 (23,200) fell by 24% compared to the first nine months of 2004 (30,500) and by half (-51%) compared to the first nine months of 2003 (46,800). Despite this sharp fall, the country remained the third largest asylum-seeker receiving country during the first nine months of 2005, accounting for 10% of all asylum requests lodged in the industrialized world. **Germany** received the fourth largest number of asylum-seekers during the same period (20,400), followed by **Austria** (15,500), **Canada** (13,900) and **Sweden** (12,400).

- From Q2 to Q3 2005, 13 countries experienced a fall in the number of new asylum claims lodged while 23 countries reported an increase. Among the larger destination countries, those reporting a significant increase in applications included **Austria (+26%)**, **Canada (+26%)**, the **Czech Republic (+47%)**, **Norway (+27%)**, **Poland (+32%)**, **Slovakia (+32%)**, **Sweden (+17%)**. **France (-18%)**, **Cyprus (-11%)**, **Greece (-40%)**, **Spain (-20%)** and **Denmark (-21%)** experienced a substantial decrease in the number of asylum seekers during Q3 of 2005.

### Origin of asylum-seekers

- In the 36 asylum countries included in this report, **Serbia and Montenegro** was the leading country of origin of asylum-seekers during the first nine months of 2005 (16,300), followed by the **Russian Federation (15,600)**, **China (14,000)**, **Turkey (9,100)**, **Iraq (8,800)**, **Haiti (8,300)**, the **Islamic Republic of Iran (6,600)**, **Nigeria (6,100)** and the **Pakistan (5,900)**
- Among the leading countries of origin, those recording a strong decline in the number of asylum-seekers during the first nine months of 2005 as compared to the same period of 2004 included **the Russian Federation (-29%)**, **Turkey (-25%)**, **Pakistan (-32%)**, **Somalia (-26%)**, **India (-51%)**, **Nigeria (-35%)**, **Bangladesh (-35%)**, **Algeria (-49%)**.
- A few countries of origin recorded a rise in asylum requests from the first nine months of 2005 compared to the same period of 2004, including **Haiti (+34%)**, **Iraq (+28%)**, **Eritrea (+32%)**, the **Syrian Arab Republic (+17%)** and **Bulgaria (+47%)**. Virtually all Haitian asylum-seekers request asylum in the **United States** and the French overseas department of **Guadeloupe**. While the number of Haitian asylum requests has remained relatively stable in the US, France has recorded a sharp increase in new applications.
- There were some changes in the ranking of the main countries of origin of asylum applicants. From the second to the third quarter of 2005, countries which moved up in their ranking included **Russian Federation** (from 3<sup>rd</sup> to 1<sup>st</sup> position), **Haiti** (from 6<sup>th</sup> to 4<sup>th</sup>), the **Islamic Republic of Iran** (from 8<sup>th</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup>), **Somalia** (from 14<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup>), **Mexico** (from 22<sup>nd</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup>) and **Eritrea** (from 32<sup>nd</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup>).
- From the second to the third quarter of 2005, the relative increase in the number of asylum requests was particularly significant for nationals from **Russian Federation (+32%)**, **Haiti (+11%)**, the **Islamic Republic of Iran (+12%)**, **Somalia (+37%)**, **India (+14%)**, **Mexico (+39%)** and **Eritrea (+104%)**.
- Countries of origin from which fewer citizens claimed asylum from Q2 to Q3 of 2005 included **China (-5%)**, **Nigeria (-5%)**, the **Democratic Republic of Congo (-5%)**, **Georgia (-17%)**, **Sri Lanka (-11%)**, **Algeria (-13%)**, and **Bosnia and Herzegovina (-31%)**.
